Submission No 201 Southern Giant Petrel Macronectes giganteus by Elliot Leach

This case involves a juvenile giant petrel (*Macronectes*) observed while seabird watching from Point Lookout, North Stradbroke Island (27° 26 11.0S; 153° 32' 47.5"E). The petrel was observed about 100 mtrs offshore from Point Lookout through both a spotting scope and binoculars. The petrel was watched for approximately one minute until it was out of sight at a distance of around 1 km away.

The combination of large size, similar to that of a small mollymawk, with a distinctive 'hunchback' large pale bill and overall chocolate brown plumage and lumbering flight identify this petrel as giant petrel, *Macronectes*, and separate it from other similar species of albatross and other large petrels. This left only Southern Giant Petrel, *M. giganteus* and the Northern Giant Petrel *M. halli* as a possible contender (Harrison 1987; Marchant and Higgins 1990; Menkhorst et al. 2017). The observers argued that the bird was a Southern Giant Petrel because there was no sign of a dark tip and the bill appeared totally concolourous and a pale straw colour. Although some committee member agreed with this identification, other committee members thought that there was not sufficient evidence provided to separate the two species and there was a remote possibility that the bird may have been a juvenile Northern Giant Petrel.
